



COMMON REACTIONS AS TCKS/CCKS TRY TO SORT OUT IDENTITY ISSUES...



"Chameleon"—tries to find "same as" identity

- "Screamer"—tries to find "different from" identity
- "Wallflower"—tries to find "nonidentity" (be invisibile)

IN THE END, EVEN PARENTS AND CHILDREN IN THE SAME FAMILY MAY NOT NECESSARILY SHARE...

- A common sense of national identity
- A similar sense of "Where is home?"

WHAT ELSE WE CAN DO — LIVE WELL IN EACH PLACE


 Intentionally explore and learn about new environment
